

Dignity and Respect Policy for pupils and families

Introduction

At Turney School we recognise that all members of the school community – school staff, parents/carers and pupils have the right to be treated with dignity and respect, creating a culture where all concerned are respectful to themselves and others.

Definition

Dignity and respect are defined as having due regard for someone's feelings, wishes or rights across the school, involving all aspects of the care and education of all pupils

Responsibilities

Senior leaders will ensure dignity and respect for pupils and families through:

<u>Pupils</u>

- Following the intimate care policy.
- Following the anti-bullying policy
- Ensuring pupils are, represented in a respectful way on the school web site, books and journals.
- Ensuring pupils feel safe around their peers and adults in the school.

Parents & Carers

- Welcoming parents and carers into the school.
- Ensuring clear and concise communication between the school and parents/carers, listening to all points of view.
- · Empathising with different perspectives.
- Assuring parents/carers of a whole school understanding of pupils' special educational needs and disability.

Teachers and Teaching Assistants

- Treating all pupils as individuals.
- Responding appropriately to parent/carer questions and concerns.
- Setting a good example to pupils at all times, showing them how to get along
- Interacting with pupils and parents/carers in a way that shows that you care about their well-being and how they feel.

Governors will ensure dignity and respect through:
